C4CA's Immediate Objectives and Activities

C4CA (**Citizens For Clean Air**) is a broad coalition of concerned citizens from throughout Oakville and Mississauga (also referred to as the Southwest GTA) that is committed to raising public awareness of the many issues arising from the 900MW fossil fuel power plant proposed for Oakville by the Ontario Government and TransCanada Energy.

C4CA's Immediate Objectives:

C4CA is pursuing many goals and activities, but key immediate objectives include:

- **Raising public awareness of the many issues** arising from the proposed 900MW power plant and trying to put ourselves on a more sensible path. **We do have time** to stop this power plant if we act! It is not too late. TransCanada Energy still must obtain many approvals before construction can begin but if we don't act this power plant will become a reality despite its serious environmental, health and socio-economic threats.
- Convincing the Ontario Ministry of the Environment that a **full Individual Environmental Assessment of the proposed power plant is required**. The current Environmental Review process that TransCanada is controlling allows it to assess itself, does not require evaluation of alternatives, and is entirely inadequate for a proposed gas plant with extraordinary features like this one. There is no need to build a power plant with so many serious issues in the already over polluted Oakville\Clarkson Airshed. There is plenty of time to develop suitable siting criteria and to assess logical alternatives, but this will not happen under the current process.
- Assisting the Town of Oakville in exercising its various municipal powers in relation to the power plant so as to ensure that the power plant proposal is fully assessed from a municipal planning perspective.
- Continuing to explore other avenues for ensuring that this aggressive and unusual power plant proposal is fully, properly and objectively assessed so as to bring to light its many troubling qualities and its comparative deficiencies before it's too late.

C4CA Activities:

C4CA:

- Has succeeded in creating significant momentum for our defence against this flawed power plant. C4CA, the Town of Oakville, City of Mississauga, and various Oakville and Mississauga ratepayer associations are waging co-ordinated opposition to the proposed plant.
- Has to-date organized over 140 Street Captains, distributed thousands of lawn signs and informational brochures and hundreds of posters to businesses. It has also organized events described elsewhere in this newsletter. Street Captains have been taking responsibility for information distribution and fundraising on their streets. These activities are in support of C4CA's plans to let the Ontario Government and TransCanada Energy know that **putting a power plant in the proposed location just does not make sense!!**

- Has assisted in the Town of Oakville's defence of its interim control by-law against the challenge by TransCanada Energy and Ford of Canada. C4CA is encouraged, and believes that all residents should be encouraged, by the **recent decision of the Ontario Municipal Board to uphold the Interim Control By-Law enacted on March 30, 2009.** Members of the community and C4CA made compelling presentations to the OMB Commissioner at the hearing forced by TransCanada Energy and Ford. Presentations were made by: Ms. Susan Hyatt, Mr Dean Hurbert, Mr. Bernard Kruyne, and Ms. Dorothy Tomiuk. Their presentations were cited in the OMB's decision. This Interim Control By-Law "prohibits power generating facilities with an energy production capacity greater than 10MW pending the review and development of more detailed criteria".

Some Reasons Why The Proposed Power Plant Just Does Not Make Sense!

The over-arching goal is to prevent the construction of the proposed power plant in the Oakville/Clarkson airshed. The power plant proposed by the Ontario Government and TransCanada Energy **just does not make sense!**

C4CA has highlighted numerous problems and serious concerns with this power plant proposal. Here are some of the key ones:

1. **Location:** The location of this plant, with its extremely unusual proximity to numerous schools and homes is illogical and reflects callous indifference to the legitimate concerns of the community.
2. **Air-Shed:** The Oakville-Clarkson airshed is already toxic and we cannot allow a massive new polluter to compound this problem.
3. **Individual Environmental Assessment:** An Individual Environmental Assessment, which should in C4CA's view expose the proposed plant's deficiencies, is not being followed.
4. **Flawed Process:** A flawed process was followed to select this location (and for all proposals considered in Oakville/Clarkson). The process defied common sense. The strict limitations from the beginning, and the narrow focus on expediency and the availability of infrastructure at this site, means that critical human issues such as the proximity of many, many schools and homes have been ignored or dismissed and far better alternatives were left unexplored.
5. **Children's Health:** Children's health will suffer disproportionately from this facility if it moves forward.
6. **Demand For Power Below Forecast:** The need and timing for new and highly polluting fossil fuel facilities is questionable given the province's power capacity/consumption trend lines.

7. **Financial:** The plant is not free by any stretch of the imagination. It poses real financial risks to Ontario taxpayers who are on the hook for the lucrative profit guarantees given to TransCanada Energy.

As just one example of the public outcry against this proposed power plant from within the Ontario Government's ranks, Oakville's MPP Kevin Flynn has said that locating this power plant in the proposed location "defies logic".

A power plant in this location is of benefit to Ford of Canada because it will be selling unused land to TransCanada Energy for the plant site.

The power plant is of benefit to TransCanada Energy because it will receive a guaranteed rate of return on its investment, regardless of how much the plant operates.

But, while they benefit, the community and children for decades to come may suffer irreversible harm.

Town of Oakville Requests New Provincial Regulation for Airborne Fine Particulate Matter

The Town of Oakville has "filed an application with the Ontario government under the Environmental Bill of Rights asking the government to institute a new regulation under the Environmental Protection Act (EPA) - or a new air pollution act if need be - that effectively regulates the emissions of airborne fine particulate matter (fine PM) to protect communities from adverse health effects."

TransCanada Awards Generator Turbines Contract to Mitsubishi Heavy Industries

Continuing to act as if the proposed power plant is a foregone conclusion, TransCanada Energy awarded a generator turbines contract to Mitsubishi Heavy Industries of Japan. However, in situations such as these it is typically necessary to have an order placed in the manufacturing queue long before actual manufacturing. Ordering must also be made well in advance because of delivery restrictions. The orders should therefore **not** be seen as reflecting the certainty of this power plant proposal, because it remains subject to many permitting and approval requirements.

Ontario Municipal Board Announces Decision in Favour of the Town of Oakville's Interim Control By-Law Restricting Construction of Power Plants

In March 2009 The Town of Oakville passed an Interim Control By-Law which "prohibits power generating facilities with an energy production capacity greater than 10MW, pending the review and development of more detailed criteria" from being built in Oakville. That was the result of the Town of Oakville not having been given enough time to assess the proposed power plant. Challenges by TransCanada Energy and Ford of Canada to set aside the interim control by-law were made in front of the Ontario Municipal Board and failed.
